Assisted offenders in viewing problems objectively and dealing with them realistically. Routinely dealt with community resources to secure information and developed release plans for the United States Probation Office. Prepared special progress reports for such consideration as parole, transfer, and restoration of forfeited good time, and made appropriate recommendations. Corresponded with attorneys, judges, probation and parole officers, and other professionals regarding an inmate's case.

• Responsible for collecting, interpreting, and evaluating factual information reflecting developmental and circumstantial factors for the assigned caseload of inmates. Acted in a liaison capacity with other units and institutional employees on matters concerning inmate behavior. Served as the primary liaison with the U.S. Parole Commission in reporting the inmate's program progress, readiness or lack of readiness for release, and resources in the community relevant to the desirability of an inmate's release.

• Developed program planning by presenting cases to the Unit Team and coordinating case management services with other correctional disciplines.

Duties:

• Responsible for the calculation of an offender's sentence as ordered by the sentencing court. Applied knowledge of case law and Bureau of Prisons policy to an offender's criminal case.

• Communicated daily with the United States Marshal Service (USMS), courts, attorneys, and other law enforcement officers in regard to an offender's outstanding warrant, pending charge, and sentence credits such as jail credit.

• Assigned as the Inmate Movement Coordinator. Communicated with the USMS and other law enforcement officials on a daily basis regarding the movement of inmates across the country. These inmates were either being released, transferred to another facility, or released on Writ to another agency to face criminal charges in their jurisdiction.

• Responsible for the accurate physical intake of newly sentenced inmates including those being transferred to other correctional facilities (both federal and state) and release of inmates to the public or to a Residential Reentry Center.

• Responsible for the search of all incoming and outgoing inmate property and the review of all inmate correspondence. These searches/reviews were to prevent illicit substances from entering the facility and intelligence gathering for gang activities and/or criminal conduct.
